
#### DATA AS REPORTED AND ACCURATE BY NCDC AS AT MIDNIGHT 16th JULY 2020

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

- Five hundred and ninety-five (595) confirmed cases were reported in the last 24 hours from 24 states Lagos (156), Ondo (95), Rivers (53), Abia (43), Oyo (38), Enugu (29), Edo (24), FCT (23), Kaduna (20), Akwa Ibom (17), Anambra (17), Osun (17), Ogun (14), Kano (13), Imo (11), Delta (6), Ekiti (5), Gombe (4), Plateau (4), Cross River (2), Adamawa (1), Bauchi (1), Jigawa (1) and Yobe (1).
- Two hundred and ninety-three (293) cases were discharged in the last 24 hours in 14 states Abia (70), Kaduna (64), Edo (51), Akwa Ibom (29), Gombe (20), FCT (19), Ogun (12), Rivers (12), Enugu (8), Oyo (3), Anambra (2), Imo (1), Ondo (1) and Sokoto (1).
- Nine (9) deaths were recorded in the last 24 hours in seven states
   Ebonyi (2), Edo (2), Adamawa (1), Anambra (1), Bayelsa (1), Kano (1) and Lagos (1).
- All 36 states in Nigeria, and the FCT, have reported a confirmed case.

Figure 2: Daily Epidemic Curve of Confirmed Cases (WK9 - WK29)





Figure 3: Age-Sex Distribution of Confirmed Cases (WK9 – WK29)



#### **PREPAREDNESS**

Since the confirmation of the first case on 27<sup>th</sup> February 2020, the NCDC has released advisories and statements to help Nigerians and affected groups in particular to respond to the pandemic

- NCDC has launched an online course on <u>Infection, Prevention and Control (IPC) for COVID-19</u>
   NCDC eLearning platform
- Ahead of forthcoming elections in the country, NCDC has issued <u>Guidelines for Conducting</u> <u>Elections During the COVID-19 Outbreak in Nigeria</u>.
- To protect our elders, and those with pre-existing medical conditions, NCDC has issued an *Advisory for Vulnerable Groups*.
- NCDC has released <u>quidelines on the re-opening of places for worship</u>.
- The Nigeria Police Force has released COVID-19 operational guidelines for the <u>Police and other</u>
   <u>Law Enforcement Agencies</u> in Nigeria
- NCDC and the Department of Hospital Services (Federal Ministry of Health) have updated the
   <u>case management guidelines</u> (version 3) with reviewed changes such as the discharge criteria
   and medication being used for the treatment of cases
- Guidelines have been issued for the <u>safe transportation of remains of persons suspected or confirmed to have died of COVID-19</u>
- Information on diagnostics of the COVID-19 virus can be found in our <u>detailed FAQ document</u>.
- To increase our testing capacity, NCDC has issued guidelines for the integration of private labs.
- Guidelines for businesses and employers have been updated.
- NCDC has updated its <u>case definition</u>, <u>community case definition</u> and <u>case management quide</u>.
- NCDC releases periodic *public health advisories* to Nigerians on the COVID-19 disease.
- To adhere to post-lockdown measures, NCDC has released an <u>advisory on the use of face masks</u>, as well as information on the <u>Use of Cloth face masks</u> and <u>how to make your cloth face masks</u>.
- NCDC has released guidelines for the <u>management of pregnant women and nursing mothers</u> during the pandemic.
- To address burials of loved ones who die from COVID-19, guidelines have been issued to advise
  on the <u>management of dead bodies</u>.
- For health centres managing cases, the following documents have been released- a guideline for the <u>Rational Use of Personal Protective Equipment in the care of COVID-19 cases</u>.
- As part of plans to increase the testing capacity of the country, the NCDC published a <u>National</u> <u>Strategy to Scale Up Access to Coronavirus Disease Testing in Nigeria</u> document.
- The Presidential Task Force has published policies and announcements on COVID-19 <u>available on</u>
   <u>the website of the Presidency</u> including presidential addresses, task force updates and
   information on livelihood and economic support.

#### **RESPONSE**

On 28<sup>th</sup> February 2020, a multi-sectoral Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) was activated at Level 3 – the highest emergency level in Nigeria –led by NCDC in close coordination with the State Public Health EOCs (PHEOC).

- Conducted a dry run to enhance preparation for the State Training of Trainer (TOT) on active case search and contact tracing with support from partners
- Received 71 Persons of Interest (POIs)/returnees from France and all were issued COVID-19 test
  appointment at the Infectious Disease Hospital (IDH), Yaba, Lagos State
- Facilitated a sensitisation workshop on COVID-19 Infection Prevention and Control (IPC)
  measures for staff and corps members at the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) secretariat in
  the FCT
- Assessed the University of Uyo Teaching Hospital, Akwa Ibom on IPC measures
- Supplied Personal Protective Equipment (PPEs) commodities to laboratory facilities at National Veterinary Research Institute (NVRI), Vom and Jos University Teaching Hospital (JUTH), Jos, Plateau State

- Deployed PPE commodities and medical devices to This Day Dome Treatment Centre in FCT
- Participated in the quarterly review meeting to identify priority risk communication activities for quarters three and four in collaboration with partners
- Deployed Rapid Response Team to Cross River
- Received a total of 552 persons of Interest (POI)/returnees from United Arab Emirates (300), UK (235) and Italy (17))
- All POIs/returnees were received, screened and given the travellers kit on arrival at the Nnamdi Azikiwe International Airport Abuja (NAIA). All returnes were issued COVID-19 test appointment
- Received donation of response supplies from the Nigerian Association of Pharmacists and Pharmaceutical Scientists in the Americas (NAPPSA)
- Supported the activation of Maitama District Hospital sample collection site in the FCT
