
DATA AS REPORTED AND ACCURATE BY NCDC AS AT MIDNIGHT 21st SEPTEMBER 2020

HIGHLIGHTS

- One hundred and ninety-five (195) confirmed cases were reported in the last 24 hours from 11 states Enugu (51), Gombe (40), Lagos (39), Plateau (23), FCT (15), Rivers (12), Kaduna (8), Ondo (3), Bauchi (2), Edo (1) and Ogun (1).
- One hundred and five (105) discharges have been reported in the last 24 hours in **seven** states – Plateau (54), Gombe (30), Kaduna (10), Osun (7), Rivers (2), Kano (1) and Lagos (1).
- Two deaths were reported in the last 24 hours in one state –Edo.
- All **36** states in Nigeria, and the FCT, have reported a confirmed case.

Figure 2: Daily Epidemic Curve of Confirmed Cases (WK9 - WK39)





Figure 3: Age-Sex Distribution of Confirmed Cases (WK9 - WK39)



PREPAREDNESS

Since the confirmation of the first case on 27th February 2020, the NCDC has released advisories and statements to help Nigerians and affected groups in particular to respond to the pandemic

- NCDC published second interim guidance Infection Prevention and Control: <u>Recommendations during health care provision for suspected and confirmed cases of</u> <u>COVID-19</u>
- NCDC recently published the first edition of a quick reference guide on setting up sample collection centre - A step by step guide on setting up a sample collection centre
- NCDC has launched an online course on <u>Infection, Prevention and Control (IPC) for</u> COVID-19 NCDC eLearning platform
- Ahead of forthcoming elections in the country, NCDC has issued <u>Guidelines for Conducting Elections During the COVID-19 Outbreak in Nigeria</u>.
- To protect our elders, and those with pre-existing medical conditions, NCDC has issued an *Advisory for Vulnerable Groups*.
- NCDC has released guidelines on the re-opening of places for worship.
- NCDC has released Strategies to Improve Surveillance for COVID-19 Guidance for States
- The Nigeria Police Force has released COVID-19 operational guidelines for the <u>Police and</u> other Law Enforcement Agencies in Nigeria
- Guidelines have been issued for the <u>safe transportation of remains of persons suspected</u> or confirmed to have died of COVID-19
- Information on diagnostics of the COVID-19 virus can be found in our <u>detailed FAQ</u> document.
- To increase our testing capacity, NCDC has issued guidelines for the <u>integration of private labs</u>.
- Guidelines for <u>businesses and employers</u> have been updated.
- NCDC has updated its <u>case definition</u>, <u>community case definition</u> and <u>case management</u> quide.
- NCDC releases periodic <u>public health advisories</u> to Nigerians on the COVID-19 disease.
- To adhere to post-lockdown measures, NCDC has released an <u>advisory on the use of face masks</u>, as well as information on the <u>Use of Cloth face masks</u> and <u>how to make your cloth face masks</u>.

- As part of plans to increase the testing capacity of the country, the NCDC published a

- The Presidential Task Force has published policies and announcements on COVID-19
 <u>available on the website of the Presidency</u> including presidential addresses, task force
 updates and information on livelihood and economic support.

RESPONSE

On 28th February 2020, a multi-sectoral Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) was activated at Level 3 – the highest emergency level in Nigeria –led by NCDC in close coordination with the State Public Health EOCs (PHEOC).

- Concluded the Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) focal point improvement plan template review meeting with state focal persons and relevant stakeholders
- Finalised plans to commence engagement with religious leaders to enhance community mobilisation in states in collaboration with partners
- Added two (2) additional laboratories (Cedar Crest and DNAlabs) to the Nigeria International Travel Portal (NITP) to test international travellers in FCT
- Ongoing discussions with security services focal persons on the proposed training of staff of their health facilities
- Ongoing deployment of IPC materials and supplies to the Laboratories in the network
- Produced new jingles and shared with Federal Ministry of Environment to increase community mobilisation
