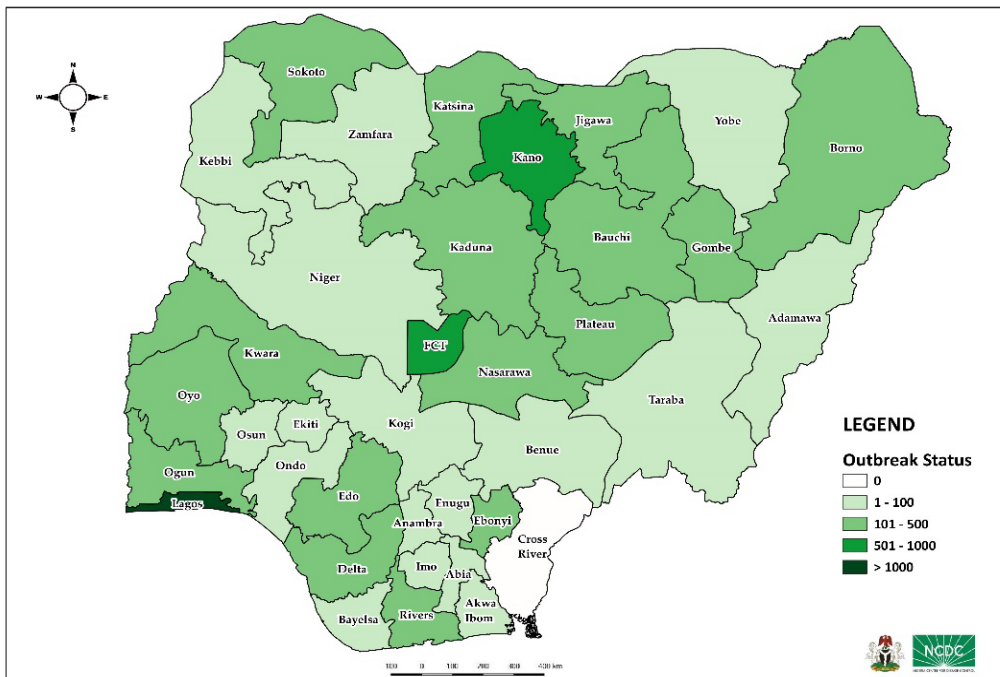
DATA AS REPORTED AND ACCURATE BY NCDC AS AT MIDNIGHT 7th JUNE 2020

HIGHLIGHTS

- Two hundred and sixty (**260**) confirmed cases were reported in the last 24 hours in nineteen (**19**) states – Abia (67), FCT (40), Lagos (38), Ogun (19), Gombe (16), Edo (14), Imo (9), Borno (8), Katsina (8), Kwara (8), Nasarawa (8), Kaduna (6), Bauchi (5), Ekiti (4), Kano (2), Niger (2), Ondo (2), Plateau (2) and Sokoto (2).
- No new state recorded a confirmed COVID-19 case in the last 24 hours. The total number of states including FCT that have reported at least one confirmed case in Nigeria is still **36** (35 states + FCT).
- One hundred and thirty-three (**133**) cases were discharged in the last 24 hours in nine (**9**) states – FCT (43), Kano (35), Ebonyi (17), Edo (13), Niger (9), Gombe (8), Rivers (6), Kaduna (1) and Osun (1).
- Twelve (**12**) deaths were recorded in the last 24 hours in six (**6**) states – Edo (5), Gombe (2), Rivers (2), FCT (1), Ogun (1)

Figure 2: Daily Epidemic Curve of Confirmed Cases (WK9 – WK23)

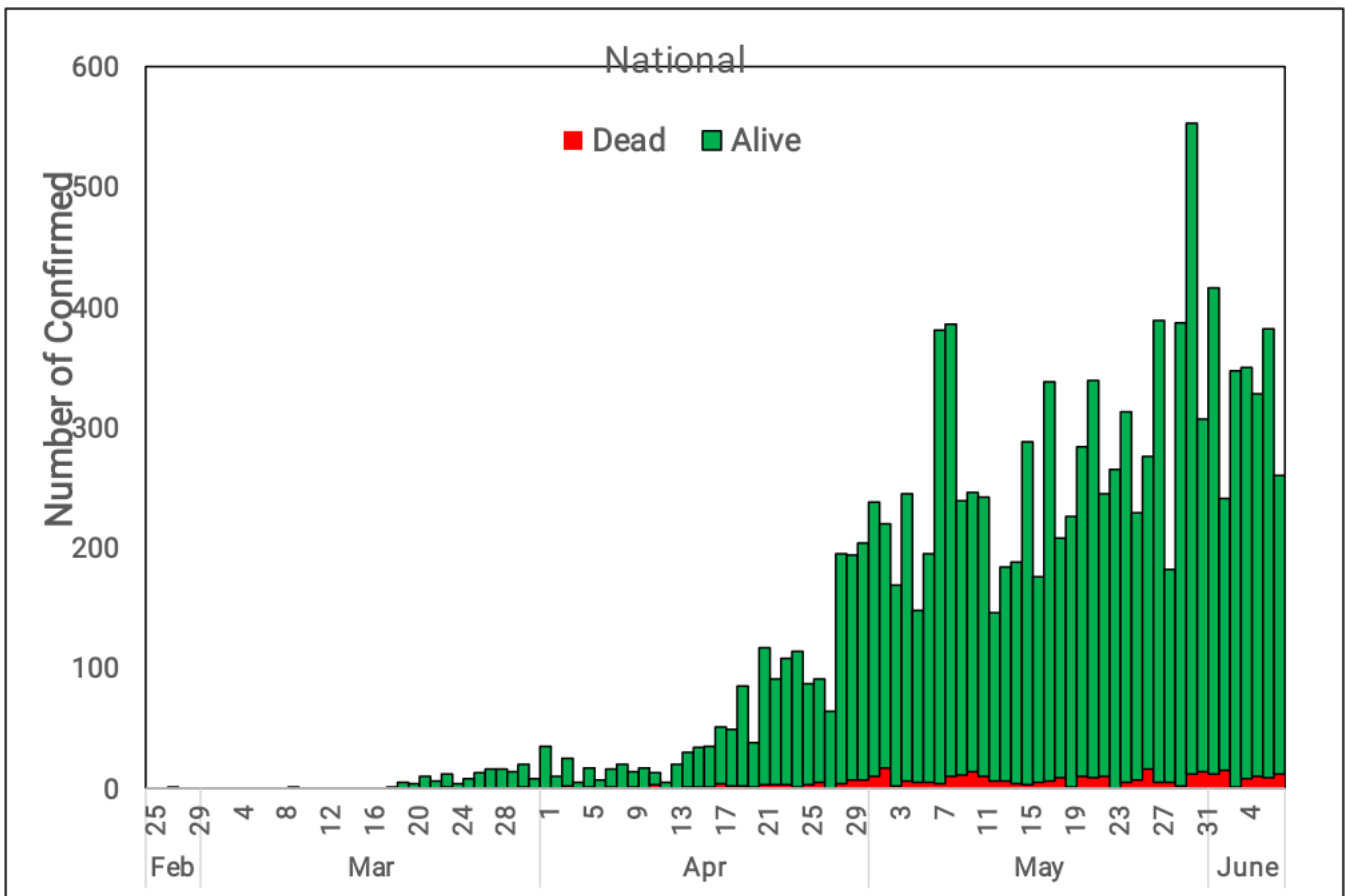
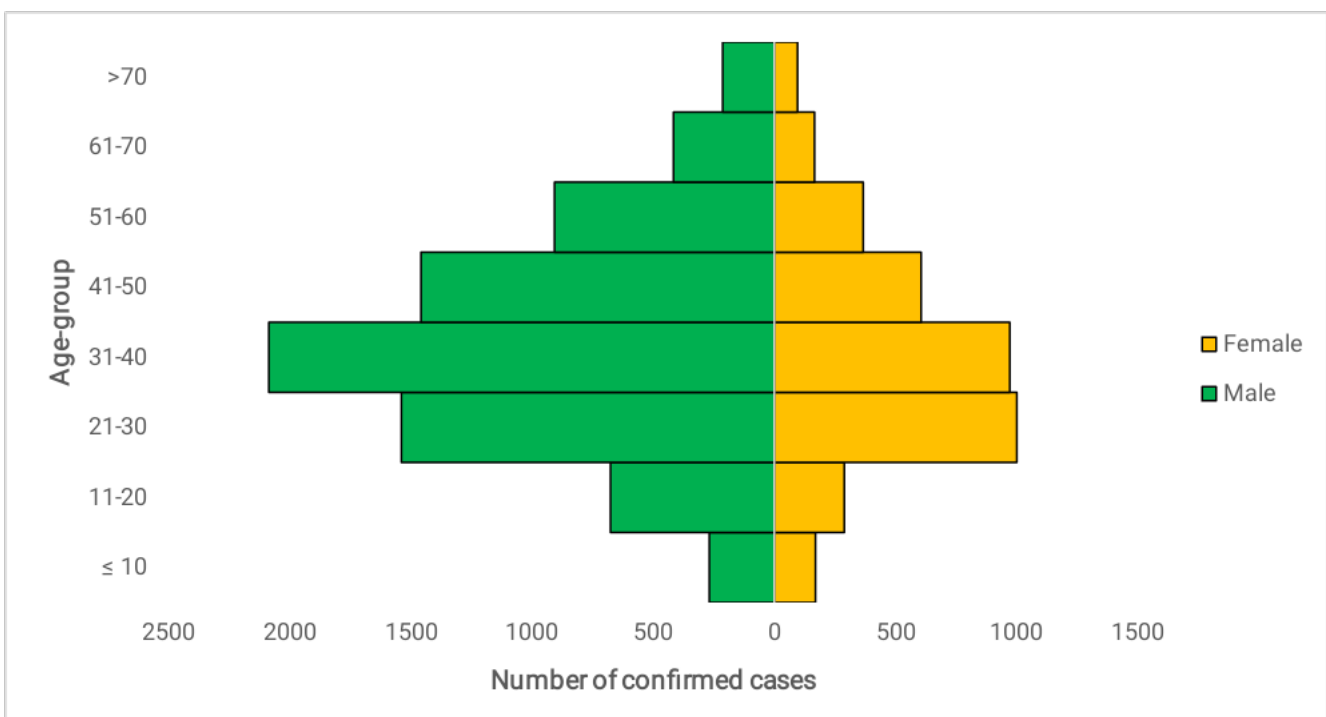


Figure 3: Age-Sex Distribution of Confirmed Cases (WK9 – WK23)



PREPAREDNESS

Since the confirmation of the first case on 27th February 2020, the NCDC has released advisories and statements to help Nigerians and affected groups in particular to respond to the pandemic

- NCDC and the Department of Hospital Services (Federal Ministry of Health) have updated the [case management guidelines](#) (version 3) with reviewed changes such as the discharge criteria and medication being used for the treatment of cases
- Guidelines have been issued for the [safe transportation of remains of persons suspected or confirmed to have died of COVID-19](#)
- Information on diagnostics of the COVID-19 virus can be found in our [detailed FAQ document](#).
- To increase our testing capacity, NCDC has issued guidelines for the [integration of private labs](#).
- Guidelines for [businesses and employers](#) have been updated.
- NCDC has updated its [case definition](#) , [community case definition](#) and [case management guide](#).
- NCDC releases periodic [public health advisories](#) to Nigerians on the COVID-19 disease.
- To adhere to post-lockdown measures, NCDC has released an [advisory on the use of face masks](#), as well as information on the [Use of Cloth face masks](#) and [how to make your cloth face masks](#).
- NCDC has released guidelines for the [management of pregnant women and nursing mothers](#) during the pandemic.

RESPONSE

On 28th February 2020, a multi-sectoral Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) was activated at Level 3 – the highest emergency level in Nigeria – led by NCDC in close coordination with the State Public Health EOCs (PHEOC).

- **Trained 15 members burial team for the Muslim community in Gwarinpa, Abuja**
- **Continuous identification and supervision of IPC focal persons in all treatment centres in the country**
- **Supported in evacuating two ill returnees in the FCT to a tertiary health facility for management**
- **Conducted training on risk communication and virtual reporting for media practitioners across the country**
- **Media appearances on radio and television on COVID-19 response**
- **Developed and disseminated contents for SMS**
- **Ongoing deployment of response supplies to Ekiti, Lagos, Ogun, Ondo, Osun and Oyo**
- **Shared strategies to improve sample collection with states**

- Official visit of the Chair of the PTF on COVID-19 /Secretary to the Government of the Federation to the National Reference Laboratory (NRL) Gaduwa
- Intensified collation of information in States to track improvement in sample collection
- Ongoing optimisation of laboratories in Akwa Ibom, Ekiti, Jigawa, Ondo, and Oyo States
- Trained second batch of 60 journalists from print and electronic media on COVID-19 reporting and fact checking of information
- Completed the deployment of COVID-19 response supplies to State Ministries of Health (SMOH), treatment centres in the States and Federal teaching hospitals and Medical Centres (FMCs) in the North West
- Set up triage centres and supplied Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to 10 primary health centres in the three high burden Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Katsina – Katsina, Daura and Ingawa
- Trained 67 Security Personnel on IPC in Ebonyi
- Developed a comprehensive intervention plan for IPC measures at primary and secondary health care facilities in Oyo
- Ongoing daily monitoring of 280 returnees/evacuees in the FCT
